A STORY FROM THE HISTORIAN:

"THE GREAT FLOOD OF 1878"

N.D. Geer had 12 acres of standing grass overflowed three feet.

In this town the rain storm was heavy; it is safe to estimate a fall of six inches and only for the nature of the soil, which is mostly sandy, there would have been a perfect flood.

Roads and bridges are more or less damaged, but no serious excavations have come to knowledge.

J.W. McDonald had about an acre of oats in the cock which floated down Big Creek. He left his wagon in the field on Thursday, and on Friday morning the only visible trace of it was the top of the hay rack.

Several tons of hay bordering Big Creek on the farm of Wm. Lawton floated down the stream and he found it necessary to boom the juvenile river to save it.

Edwin Lamphear lost several tons of hay on the river flats. It floated off down the old Oswegatchie as gayly as a young duck.

On H. C. Parson's farm an acre of hay, standing, was a foot under water on Saturday.

The frequent rains since the 20th of July have raised the streams to nearly full banks and Big Creek was well up previous to the great storm. The rills were never known so high before, with one exception, which was about 15 years ago, in the month of August.
